Step 1: Choose the Right Wine Region

Before booking wineries, decide what kind of experience you want.

Ask yourself:

- Do you prefer iconic and well-known or relaxed and under-the-radar?
- Are you looking for walkable tasting rooms or scenic vineyard drives?
- How far are you willing to drive between stops?
- Are reservations required in this region?

Research 2–3 regions before committing. The vibe of Napa is very different from Paso Robles or Santa Barbara.

Step 2: Plan for Pace, Not Volume

One of the most common mistakes wine travelers make is overbooking.

Recommended pace:

- 2 wineries per day = relaxed and immersive
- 3 wineries per day = structured but manageable
- 4+ wineries per day = rushed and exhausting

Remember:

Tastings often last 60–90 minutes. Add drive time, lunch, and lingering.

Pro Tip:

Build in a lunch stop or scenic break between tastings.

Step 3: Keep All Details Together

Avoid digging through emails while standing in a vineyard parking lot.

Keep track of:

- Reservation confirmations
- Addresses and drive times
- Tasting fees
- Notes on what you loved
- Wine purchases and shipping details

Use one central place to organize your research, reservations, and itinerary. A structured planning system makes all the difference.

- Make reservations in advance. Walk-ins are rare in many California regions.
- Eat before your first tasting.
- Stay hydrated throughout the day.
- Don't be afraid to ask questions.
- Quality experiences matter more than quantity.
